Anton's parents, Gabe and Pat Anton, found her the perfect dwelling to transthough there's a significant other form - a foreclosed house that had been vacant for two years.

"It was a 1953 ranch that had been turned into a 3,100-square-foot split-level by a builder," says Anton. "It was all white ceramic tile flooring with pink-and-teal foil wallpaper. It looked like a tacky Florida house, but the bones were good, and I knew I could make it work."

Today, the house is filled with warm. earthy tones and crimson accents and boasts an Old World ambiance. Anton installed hickory floors and, with the help of decorative painter Greg White, applied faux paint treatments on walls and columns. The kitchen came to life with taupe granite counters, glazed maple custom cabinets, a tumbled marble backsplash, stainless-steel appliances and romantic touches, such as a charming seating area next to a fireplace, curvy wrought-iron
